Owner-reported behaviours of concern regarding dogs recently adopted from UK rehoming centres

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Undesirable behaviours are often the primary reason for relinquishment of dogs¹ and for unsuccessful adoptions². It is therefore important to identify unwanted behaviours early post-adoption to provide owners with expert advice and support. Here, we outline a new project for the provision of behaviour-related post-adoption support for owners adopting dogs across 20 UK Dogs Trust rehoming centres (approximately 1000 dogs per month on average). Owner-reported behaviour issues were identified during standardised telephone interviews conducted at approximately 2-5 days and 14-18 days after adoption. Owners were asked about the presence/absence of specific behaviours in their dogs and to report any other behaviours of concern. Owners were given the opportunity to be referred for advice from behaviour specialists within Dogs Trust.

These data will be used to identify owner-reported behavioural issues in newly adopted dogs. Future analyses will include risk factor analysis on the occurrence of specific behaviour issues in the home, and the effect, if any, of post-adoption support on the rate of dogs being returned to centres. Importantly, the project will be used to inform strategies for supporting owners of rehomed dogs, with the aim of increasing the success of adoptions.
