HERE ARE OUR TOP TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR DOG SAFE FROM THIEVES AS WELL AS WHAT TO DO SHOULD YOUR DOG GO MISSING*

Keep your dog:

★ Safe

- Ensure that your house and property boundaries are secure keeping your dog in and intruders out.
- Fit garden gates with a sturdy lock to prevent trespassers gaining easy access to your property.
- Have your dog spayed/neutered to reduce their desire to stray and make them less desirable to thieves.
- Ensure your dog is wearing a tag with YOUR name, phone number and address on it.
- Ensure your dog is microchipped and that your contact details are kept up-to-date with your database provider.
- Join your local Neighbourhood Watch scheme and make your community more secure by looking out for your neighbours.
- Be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the police.

Spottable

- Keep your dog in sight when they are in the garden and never leave them unsupervised.
- If you're exercising your dog off-lead, always keep them in sight and pay attention to what they are doing.
- Make sure your dog is trained to reliably respond to a recall command regardless of where they are.
- Never leave your dog unattended in a public place – even if it's just for a minute.
- Never leave your dog unattended in a car; not only is your dog at risk of being stolen but they can easily overheat.

Searchable

- Report the theft to the police, ensuring you get a crime reference number and insist that your dog is recorded as stolen and not missing.
- Report the theft of your dog to your local authority dog warden and notify your microchip database provider.
- Contact local animal centres, rescue charities, your local vet and any neighbouring practices so that they are aware of the incident and can keep an eye out for your dog.
- Always keep up-to-date photos of your dog, making sure that they clearly show any distinctive features your dog may have. These will aid your search well, should your dog go missing.
